

#### CENTREVILLE DAY HISTORY TRAIN

You might have noticed that Centreville's historic district doesn't look much like the historic downtowns of Manassas, Herndon or even Clifton. Trains are the reason. After the Civil War commerce followed the rails. Trains do an amazing job of transporting goods but they don't climb hills well and Centreville sits on top of a hill. Railways were built along easier grades south and north of the town, but never into the heart of Centreville. Consequently places like Manassas grew and prospered but Centreville did not.

There was one railroad that did make it nearly into Centreville and made Centreville famous in railroad history: it was the world's first railroad built for military purposes in the winter of 1861-1862. The Centreville Military Railroad was built by the Confederate Army to bring supplies from Manassas Junction to the tens of thousands of soldiers camped in and around Centreville that winter. The railroad didn't last long. Completed February 1862, it was destroyed by the same army that built it, as they withdrew from Centreville to the south in March 1862.

Ride the Centreville Day homage to our town's brief role in rail history and learn a little more about the historic sites you'll see along the way.

**Mount Gilead & Jamesson Cemetery.** Mount Gilead was built in 1785 as a tavern. Owner Joel Beech advertised that he did not permit card playing at his establishment, a popular pastime in taverns. The tavern closed soon after. The Jamesson family owned the house from 1837 into the 1930s. A large monument marks the family cemetery. **OPEN FOR TOURS!** 

**St. John's Church & Cemetery**. St. Johns Church was built in 1854. Early in the Civil War, St. John's made the front page of the New York Times as Northern and Southern reporters argued over which army was responsible covering the little church with graffiti. Two Confederate soldiers, executed for assaulting a superior officer, are buried in the cemetery. The two oldest headstones, of John Orr and his daughter. **CHURCH OPEN FOR TOURS!** 

**Spindle Sears House.** Robert and Wilma Spindled ordered their home from a 1933 Sears catalogue. The Brentwood Model House Kit (the deluxe version with the cedar shakes) is virtually unchanged from when it was built in 1934. The Fairfax County Park Authority has carefully restored the house and it is open for tours today. OPEN FOR TOURS!

**Royal Oak Tree**. The large, dead, oak tree at the top of the hill across the street from the Spindle Sears House marks the site of Royal Oaks, once one of the largest houses in town.

**Harrison House.** The house on the corner of Braddock and Mt Gilead was once the home of Thomas D. Harrison who was a blacksmith. The little shed under the trees may have been Harrison's blacksmith shop.

**Old Stone Church & Warrenton Turnpike**. During the Battles of First d Second Manassas the church was used as a hospital by the Union Army. Down at the bottom of the hill by the church is where, on the morning of July 21, 1861, the Union army turned westward to engage in the first great battle of the Civil War, the Battle of First Manassas. **OPEN FOR TOURS!** 

Havener House: Is an early example of real estate development in Centreville. Francis Adams, who lived at Mount Gilead, had the structure built about 1792 as a combined store and dwelling house and rented it to aspiring shop keepers. Over the years, Havener House has served as an inn, a post office, and, during the Civil War, as a military hospital. **OPEN FOR TOURS** 


**The Stuart-Mosby Museum,** it was originally a gas station in the early 20th century. Oral histories hold that the stone was once part of Grigsby House, where a young private named John Mosby first met JEB Stuart. **OPEN FOR TOURS!**

#### 2019 CENTREVILLE DAY CITIZENS of the YEAR



#### DENNIS HOGGE CENTREVILLE DAY CITIZEN of the YEAR and HONORED COMMUNITY HISTORIAN

Dennis Hogge is invested in Centreville's history both metaphorically and literally. Growing up in a more rural Fairfax County, Dennis roamed fields, collected relics and developed an early interest in the area's history. As an adult Dennis' interests led him to purchasing historic houses in Centreville, including Payne's General Store and Restaurant, Merchant Tire, the Enos M. Utterback House, and the Havener House. Rather than develop the land, Dennis preserved these buildings and worked with other advocates of historical preservation to help establish the Centreville Historic Overlay District in 1986. Mr

Hogge was also a key advocate for the expansion of the Historic District in 2007.

The same year the Historic District was first established, Dennis saved a stone gas station from demolition, moving it from its original location on Lee Highway to its present location behind the Havener House on Braddock Road. The reason? The stones used to build the station had been salvaged from the Four Chimney House, built at the end of the 18th century. Among other events, the stones witnessed to the first meeting of Colonel JEB Stuart and ,then Private, John S. Mosby. Coincidentally, the little stone building now houses the Stuart-Mosby Calvary Museum.

These preservation efforts alone warrant Mr. Hogge's recognition as a Centreville Day Citizen of the Year, but Dennis has also made contributions to investigating and recording Centreville area history. In particular he has researched and assembled Civil War photographs of Centreville and the surrounding area taken by Brady studio photographers. The result are two compelling volumes of hundreds of images returned to their historical context: *Mathew Brady's Photo Journal* and *Mathew Brady's First Manassas*. This books enrich our understanding of Centreville during the Civil War and enhance public awareness of the roll Centreville played in the war.

The Centreville Day Planning Committee and the Friends of Historic Centreville is thus proud to present the 2019 Centreville Day Citizen of the Year and Honored Community Historian Award to Mr. Hogge. We also wish to acknowledge the support of Karen Hogge who has shared these lifetime achievements with Dennis for 41 years.




