Welcome to the New Resident Curators



You may notice that Mount Gilead is not open for tours this year because it is undergoing repairs in anticipation of new residents, the Marott family. In 2023 Spencer and Kristyn Marrott applied to be the resident curators at Mount Gilead. They completed a daunting application and survived both community and professional review of their proposals to help preserve Mount Gilead for the future and for it to become their new family home. Their application was approved, but their movein date was unfortunately delayed as the Park Authority sought permission to remove the dilapidated garage and to schedule repairs to the

roof. The lease should be signed soon and move in by the start of 2025.

The objective of the Fairfax County Resident Curator Program (RCP) is to help preserve historic buildings within the county by offering long-term leases to qualified tenants who agree to rehabilitate and maintain the buildings in accordance with established preservation standards. Curators pay their rent largely in the form of payments for agreed upon property maintenance expenses, they also pay their own utilities, and county property taxes. Tenants must also provide periodic public access to appreciate the historical significance of the properties. Fortunately for Centreville, Kristyn and Spencer happily embrace their role as educators (Kristyn is a teacher) and have been working with the Centreville Day Planning Committee to keep Mount Gilead a vital part of the community.

In their application the Marrotts wrote:

While one may look at Mount Gilead and think nothing special — no one famous slept there, no great American novel was penned there — that is exactly why it deserves to be preserved. A home is a special place because it is where history is lived every day. In a world where the main goal is to be famous, it would be nice to use the simple significance of a home as the focal point for looking into the future. We will emphasize this in our plans for the future of Mount Gilead. The variety of ideas we have to serve and educate the community would make our home a place of authentic learning for generations to come as we invite others to witness all that Mount Gilead represents.

In addition to Kristyn's work as a teacher, the Marrotts own Five Star Painting, this year's sponsor of the Mount Gilead Historical Area. We look forward to working with Kristyn and Spencer in this new chapter of Mount Gilead's ongoing story. Be sure to stop by Mount Gilead or at the stage and welcome them to the neighborhood.



DENNIS HOGGE COMMUNITY HISTORY AWARD Mr. Alfred Schenk moved to Centreville in 1972. As a management and program analyst with Defense Information Systems Agency, Mr. Schenk is conversant with modern technology, but he is also appreciated for his talent as an oral historian, sharing memories that include the first Giant and Peoples Drugstore at Newgate Shopping Center, when Braddock Road crossed Rt. 29 by the original Centreville Elementary School. Does anyone recall Ewell's eatery on Rt. 29, or the story of the First Baptist Primitive Church in the Bull Run Post Office Road area? Mr. Schenck's love and respect for his neighbors and their ancestors is expressed through remembering and sharing their stories. Mr. Schenk was also ordained as a deacon in 2023 for Mount Olive Baptist Church. His service to church and community



includes providing security for the church, helping the Church's program to provide food and backpacks to children at Centreville Elementary School, and, most recently, by enthusiastically serving on the 2024 Centreville Study Task Force.

Dennis Hogge (1949-2024) loved history and embraced it in many ways, from writing a published historical account of the Brady studio's photographic survey of Centreville, to owning and preserving historic buildings, being a public advocate for preservation, and simply cherishing and sharing the memories of his youth and the elders he knew. The Community History award celebrates the many ways community history is shared, recorded, and preserved.

COMMUNITY PARTNER Michael Coyle has served the Sully District for 25 years. In that time he has helped both constituents and supervisors with decisions and plans regarding everything from roads, to land use decisions, to assistance with pets. His institutional knowledge was so valuable that he remained on the staff of the Sully District Supervisor even after Michael Frey retired and Kathy Smith was elected. We are grateful for his support for Centreville Day and his work as a public servant and wish him all the best in the future.

CENTREVILLE DAY CITIZENS of the YEAR

On this 32nd Centreville Day, the Planning Committee is proud to continue to recognize individuals and groups that have given the greater Centreville community years of service, leadership, and heart. This year we are also inaugurating the Dennis Hogge Community History Award.

CITIZEN OF THE YEAR Mr. Nicholas Anderson has served the youth and families of our community for many years. Fifteen years ago, Mr. Anderson applied for a grant position as the After-School Specialist at Stone Middle School. In his role at Stone, Mr. Anderson (or Mr. A as he is known to the students) organizes after-school programs to engage and further develop the students' intellectual, physical, and social-emotional well-being. Stone was a pilot school for the after-school program and Mr. Anderson continuously shared his learning and provided leadership to other middle schools and to new specialists. Mr. A's office, Room 141, is the heart of the Prowlin' Panthers Afterschool Program Students and parents appreciate the extra efforts that Mr. Anderson puts forth to keep everyone informed and to provide a variety of opportunities. There were 5 school clubs when Mr. Anderson began and now there more than 30, including the first competitive hip hop and jazz dance teams. Mr. A also encourages leadership and mentors students into their high school years and generally helps students find



reasons to be at school for learning and growing. The middle school years can be challenging for many students and Mr. A is an encouraging and friendly role-model who helps guide their development. As one student said, "He's a cool staff member and helped me develop my athletic interests."

BUSINESS CITIZEN OF THE YEAR Cox Farms began as a family business that included a 40 acres farm near Herndon and a vegetable stand in Vienna in 1972. In 1979, Gina Richard and Eric Cox bought 116 acres on Braddock and Pleasant Valley Road despite naysayer remarks of "Nobody will ever travel that far out" to pick pumpkins and strawberries. They enticed groups out with hayrides and

then they expanded into a fall festival in 1985. Families came out to pet the goats (so many little goats), take turns on the whimsical slides, and ride in a wagon past Martians that traveled in a silver flying saucer. They went home with pumpkins and pies and came back the next year. Half the fun was seeing what new feature, or llama, had been added. In 2009 the Fields of Fear were planted. Today, the Cox Farm festival is the highest attended fall festival in the DMV.

There are many ways to serve your community, we see the festival itself as a contribution to Centreville, but Cox Farm does more. They offer Free and Reduced Admission to Title 1 Kindergartens throughout the DMV, make in-kind donations to support families and schools,

and have donated more that \$75,000 through the Holiday Donation campaign established in 2011. Cox Farm considers, "helping our neighbors an important responsibility that we take seriously. Through partnerships and our cultivated community initiatives, we hope to provide local families and organizations with resources and activities that lead to healthier, happier communities."








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
